

Please no dogs on the trails and they need to be at campers during meals. **Directions:** See next page.



## Blue Creek Bay Ride - Sunday, JULY 22

We should meet at Blue Creek Bay at 9:00, in the saddle by 10:00. Need to **RSVP by July 18th** to accommodate for trailer parking. <u>Need to be on time</u> so we can get the trailers parked and be ready to leave at 10:00. <u>Directions:</u> I-90 east of Coeur d'Alene. Take the Wolf Lodge/Harrison exit, turning left and crossing I-90. Then left on to the Yellowstone Trail. Travel west and north about 2.5 miles along the Yellowstone Trail and park on side of road.

# Marie Creek Ride - Sunday, AUGUST 5

This is not a beginner's ride. Horse need to have shoes or boots as the trail has rocks and lots of shale. Boots in the saddle by 9:00 AM. **RSVP** by July 31st. Pack a lunch, no dogs, arrive with a smile and be ready to have fun. **Directions:** I-90 east of Coeur d'Alene take the Harrison exit (# 22) and turn north. Turn right at the stop sign on the frontage road. Go 1.4 miles and turn left on Wolf Lodge Road. After 4.5 miles turn right on Marie Creek Road. After approximately 2 miles turn right on the one-lane entry to the trailhead. There is no trailhead sign there (or if there was, it is buried in weeds), but where the entrance splits away there is a large sign stating that motor vehicles must stay on designated roads.



**DIRECTIONS:** Red Ives is on the upper part of the St Joe River above the town of Avery. A sure fire way to get there is take I-90 to the Hwy 3/Rose Lake exit #34, go south to St Maries. At about 22 miles there is a stop sign/light at the Hwy 3/Hwy 97 Harrison "Y". From there go about 10.25 miles, at the 35 signs. The last 10 miles is paved, but narrow with few turnouts, so take it slow and carefully. Again, look for one our red and white PBCH arrow signs at Miles speed sign and Avery/Caulder sign, take a left onto St Joe River Road (NF-50). It's about 90 miles from St Maries to Red Ives all on paved roads. Approximately at the 73 mile marker there's a bridge on the right to Red Ives that crosses Gold Creek. Look for one of our red and white PBCH arrow he Red Ives Historic Ranger Station directing you across the bridge to the camping area.
