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Our May meeting featured a member of the US Border Patrol describing their use of mustangs in their mounted units working along the US/Canadian border. It would have come as no surprise to those of you familiar with wild mustangs that these horses are a "can do" partner in the BP's work along that rugged border.

We talked at some length about the Line Cr Horse Camp project and this is a good opportunity to share that information with those not at the meeting. We have secured a \$500 grant from the BCHI Foundation and a \$1500 grant from Northwest Farm Credit Services for the project. We'll be separating the stock use area from the rest of the camp ground, creating two additional sites with feed bunks in the stock only area, installing steel fire rings, brushing out trails and generally sprucing up the area. The trail boss for the project (me) will be on site 6/8-14. There is a lot of work to be done and we hope to complete it by the 14th. If you plan to help, let me know when so we can plan. Development of the Line Cr. Campground was a PBCH project before my time so I ask a couple people who were there to talk about their recollections. Sharon Bruce sent me this: When I joined PBCH in 1986 the Line Creek Campground was just starting it's planning stages. First time I went there it was just a dirt road in a field. Horse trailers parked randomly in a small field. Joe Swendig was president and we helped plan the campground with the F.S. It was at that time supposed to be stock use only. There was a lot of use then as 4 wheelers hadn't been invented. A lot of use from St. Maries etc. We had several planning meetings with the F.S. Our first work trip that I can recall was building several feed bunks. We did most of the cutting at one of the members home and transported them there installing over the weekend. We stayed in the F.S. rental cabin as it was very early spring. A large turnout with probably 15-20 members participating. A great time. Some of the members were Joe Swendig, Charlie Nagle, Harry Hoener, Randy Hansen, Marvin Hasse, Bob Shackleford who was a member and F.S. employee, myself and many more. Many other early projects included high lines, more feed bunks etc. Over the years the Line Creek trailhead has been one of the primary project areas we participated If I had to say total hours that have been put in on the trailhead alone it would easily surpass 1,000 hours. That doesn't include trail work. At that time there were about 40-50 members.

Border Patrol Uses Adopted Mustangs

Border patrol agent Bryan D. Ford showed a presentation and then answered questions about what the agency does and how they obtain their stock at the May PBCH meeting. His presentation was on the activity of the Metaline Falls, WA border patrol.

They use wild Mustangs that they purchase from the BLM. These animals are first green broke by prison inmates. These horses are hardy with good bone and stocky and work well for the job they do, he said.

The border patrol program pays \$525.00 for the gelded mustangs they choose. These animals are first green broke by prison inmates. After that the agents continue to finish them. They only buy geldings.

When they go out to work, they work in pairs, riding and pony a pack horse. The pack animals carry 150 to 200 lbs or less. They will go in larger groups if the situation warrants it, he said.

They have over 200 agents in this Northwest area. A lot of the patrolling is drug related between the USA and Canadian border. The border patrol works closely with Canadian authorities as the roads are limited for access in many areas so they are aware of many areas where people may try to enter the country illegally.

Many areas do not allow for motorized vehicles or access may be restricted due to terrain, thus the border patrol has an advantage using horses to access remote areas.

SAR (search and rescue) takes priority. The patrol agents have authority to make the decision on SAR calls to continue or stop due to terrain, rider safety, horse safety, probability of success or failure etc.

Emergency Care Clinic

I attended a clinic at McKinley Peters Hospital May 26 and learned about horse behavior, first aid, and ways to keep your horse healthy amid the dangers of colic, lacerations, acute lameness, laminitis, eye injuries, choke, and allergies to name a few.

This 2-hour clinic is just one in a line of free clinics put on by this vet. The trick is signing up and hoping your name gets called to attend at the Newman Lake, WA facility off Harvard and Trent in the Spokane Valley.

The first thing Dr. Bob Peters said was to keep yourself safe when treating or attending to a sick or injured animal. They can behave differently when under duress, something people don't expect, he said. He said to remain calm and be prepared. Try to find someone to assist you. Take vital signs and try to recognize some of the signs.

Being prepared could mean having a horse trailer available in case of evacuation due to flood or fire or for quick transport. Being prepared with first aid kits. Being prepared to know what your horse's normal vital signs are as a starting point for treating the animal.

He took us through first aid for some ailments and talked about recognizing the symptoms of injuries and illness. Applying pressure to bleeding wound, washing out a wound or an eye with saline, giving Banamine to a colicky horse are a few examples.

Having a good first aid kit for your barn, horse trailer and on the riding trail are important too. Vet wrap, duct tape, saline solution, thermometer, latex gloves, gauze and antihistamine were a few items he mentioned.

Knowing what your horse's vital signs when they are healthy will help you as a starting point when they appear sick. Knowing the temperature 99 to 101.5, heart rate 24-40 and respiratory rate 12-20 bpm are all normal ranges. Listen to gut sounds, determine if horse is lethargic, is the horse eating and pooping? Is he lying down for an extended time?
