Best Kept Secret in North Idaho

BEST KEPT SECRET IN NORTH IDAHO

Panhandle Back Country Horseman (PBCH) established a chapter from Back Country Horseman Idaho in 1984, comprised of all volunteer horsemen and horsewomen, dedicated to keeping open and maintaining National Forest, State Forest and State Park trails for all public use.

Certified by the U.S Forest Service for the use of chainsaws with a focus on safe cutting and certified CPR and AED use, the volunteers provide a valuable service to the community. Presently our membership totals 61 members with about 20 certified cutters with 10 new members awaiting training and sawyer certification.

After tough winters in North Idaho we all know about the tangled mess of down tree blocking access to our favorite trails. Whether hiking, biking, mushroom or huckleberry picking, horse back riding or just plain meandering through our forests, fallen trees often ruin our best plans for an enjoyable outing.

PBCH also repairs bridges, installs hitching posts at various trailheads and sprays for noxious weeds. We repaired the corrals at Farragut State Park and installed a metal welded hitching post.

At Line Creek campground near Red Ives, PBCH moved and rebuilt feed bunkers, installed highlines for horses and repaired other structures.

In May PBCH will participate in a three-day training and trail clearing project with the Priest River chapter and both chapters will work out of a campsite at Reynolds Creek. It will be an old fashioned rendezvous, exchanging ideas, training tips and of course clearing trails.

All of our chapters are volunteers, very little dollars come from limited paid details from USFS.

Horse use, events and such is the #4 money maker for the state of Idaho. This is encouraging political leaders to fund money to fix up horse facilities and trail heads.

5. Importance of weed free hay on state and USFS land was discussed. Arnie brought up that the fine in Washington state is \$100 for not having the weed free hay. Will put article in newsletter.



Arizona Winter

We came down to Apache Junction, AZ on Nov. 5, 2022 in our living quarters with three horses (Magic, Red and Laredo), two cats (sparky and tigger) and our dog Flossie. Since coming down we've met a great group of horse people. Joined the East Valley BCH and SHA (Superstition Horsemen's Association).

The plan was to stay and travel around for one month which has turned into 5 months. We became gypsies and lot-hopped until we found our own winter home. The cats were very happy to have the additional space.
