
Motion made by Tom Knoll and second by Betsy Walker to purchase 2 helmets and 2 chaps for \$330. Motion approved

Foundation BCHI

Purpose and Definition of The Foundation as related to BCHI.

1. What we are:

The Foundation is a sister corporation to the BCHI and operates under its own bylaws and articles of incorporation within the framework of a 501(c) 3 non-profit organization. The Foundation was incorporated in September 1999.

2. What we do:

The Foundation was established to provide an avenue for any BCHI chapter to solicit funds that would go to the Foundation and be distributed to the local chapters within the guidelines specified by the donor of the funds. By allocation of the funds through the Foundation, the donation becomes a tax write-off for the donor and tax-free income to the chapters. This is achievable due to the Foundation's non-profit status. One of the responsibilities of the Foundation Director, or Alternate, is to express its chapter's needs in terms of projects and funds required.

3. What are our goals?

It is our goal that every chapter provide a representative to serve on the Foundation. The Foundation meets once a year at the BCHI State Convention and conducts business throughout the year via email and phone. The Foundation will help local chapters in grant writing, and as requested.

**PBCH did request and receive Litehouse grant money through the Foundation to build at the trailheads. We have installed hitching rails at a few local trailheads.

PBCH Foundation chapter director is Jim Kimball.

The Foundation will help donors get the tax write-off they need. In addition, the Foundation will be trying to obtain donations and grants that can be used by all chapters in Idaho. Once able to acquire monies for distribution, all chapters will be notified of how to apply for a share of these monies.

Back County Horsemen of America was founded in January of 1973 by four men in Montana's Flathead Valley.

These four men Ken Ausk, Dulane Fulton, Dennis Swift and Roland Cheek used their specialized knowledge of stock and the back country to bring changes and modifications of restrictive stock management by public officials, according to the BCHA website. It is dedicated to the following mission:

- *To perpetuate the commonsense use and enjoyment of horses in America's back country and wilderness.
- *To work to ensure that public lands remain open to recreational stock use.
- *To assist the various government and private agencies in their maintenance and management of said resource.
- *To educate, encourage and solicit active participation in the wise use of the back country resource by horsemen and the general public commensurate with our heritage.
- *To foster and encourage the formation of new state Back Country Horsemen's organizations.

Our grassroots members help carry forward our organization's mission and values throughout the United States and Canada working closely with trail partners and local land management agencies to clear and maintain trails.
