PBCH Member attends LNT Training Written by Joni Lueck

Ginger Swisher attended the week-long Leave No Trace (LNT) workshop at Ninemile Ranger Station in Montana May 13-17 and is fired up to teach these principles to the members this year.

She was able to attend the workshop near Missoula through monies the chapter put up for this enriching program.

LNT is a program designed to help educate others about the practical use of stock in the woods and how to leave no trace of your being in the area. She also studied the needs of other trail users, the environmental uses and needs of front and back country areas and thereby learning how those needs are different.

During the five-day workshop, much of it in the field, folks were fed Dutch Oven-cooked meals and attended class inside a wall tent set up in the field. The ranger station near Alberton, MT is an historic remount depot for pack stock in the Lolo National Forest.

Most of the seminar dealt with principles of use of stock animals, how to co-exist with other groups and to leave the environment in a good way, she said. She learned about the needs of different user groups such as bicyclists, llama handlers, hikers and backpackers, motorcycles and four-wheeler users and how to co-exist with them and to respect their needs, she added.

Much of the training was by example using pack stock and by setting up a camp of their own. For example, setting up a high line correctly, how to use tree savers and where to tie the animal so it doesn't damage the tree were learned in a hands-on setting rather than a sit-down, lecture format, Setting up our own camps and having them critiqued for placement was a learning experience too, she said.

It was well taught by retired Nine Mile packer Bob Hoverson and well-known outfitter Smoke Elser. The message of LNT is taught practically. It inspired me to come back and teach, she said.

"I would like to put on small courses at the chapter meeting or on the trail to make people aware of the concepts of LNT," she said.

Seven principles of LNT are: plan ahead and prepare; travel and camp on durable surfaces; dispose of waste properly; leave what you find; minimize campfire impact; respect wildlife; and be considerate of others.

Scholarship Information

Panhandle Back Country Horsemen will grant two individuals with a \$500 scholarship each. They must meet the below requirements and be selected by the Board of Directors. The goal of the scholarship is to assist young people in the rising cost of tuition. Individuals must be willing to be involved in trail conservation, education and horsemanship through PBCH membership. Below are requirements to be eligible:

- 1. Membership in PBCH chapter. You can download the membership application from www.pbch.org web site.
- 2. Attend 3 meetings throughout the year.
- 3. Participate in two club-sponsored activities such as work parties and fund raisers.
- 4. Complete a 500-word essay entitled "What it means to be involved in PBCH."
- 5. Maintain 2.7 GPA or above in school.
- 6. Must be age 16 or older or be a graduate of 2013 or 2014.

The above requirements must be completed from Jan. 31 to Jan. 31 of the following year.

Eligibility and determination of individuals to be awarded the scholarships will be decided by PBCH Board of Directors.

Scholarship may only be used for the following items unless authorized by the PBCH BOD.

- 1. College or other higher education tuition.
- 2. College textbooks.
- 3. Computers and other school equipment.


