

2025 Calendars



The prizes include 11 gift cards worth \$500 each. The grand prize is a \$3,000 gift card.



St. Joe Ranger District

The St. Joe River area of the Idaho Panhandle National Forests includes most of what was originally established as the St. Joe National Forest and is now our St. Joe Ranger District.

This is an area of blue-ribbon cutthroat trout streams, Wild and Scenic Rivers, and extensive road less and primitive areas. We offer miles of trails for hikers, backcountry horse users, mountain bikers, and ATV riders. The St. Joe is nationally recognized for its elk herds.

"""Line Creek Stock Camp features 9 pull through units for stock trailers, feed bunks and hitch posts, trailhead parking, and vault toilets. There is no developed water. Attractions include fishing in wild trout waters, beginning of wild portion of St. Joe Wild and Scenic River, and St. Joe River Trailhead.

""""Directions:

Drive 29 miles east of Avery on St. Joe River Road (Forest Highway 50), turn south on Red Ives Road (#218) and proceed 11 miles to the campground entrance.


